- ◆ Idioms are English phrases that have special meanings different from the words they consist of.
- ◆ For example, kick the bucket does not mean to literally hit a bucket with one's foot; rather it means "to die." Likewise to hold your horses does not mean to stand next to a group of horses and hold onto their bridles; rather, it means "to wait."
